Sexual Violence Resources Abroad and in California

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Introduction

“The University of California is committed to creating and maintaining a community dedicated to the advancement, application and transmission of knowledge and creative endeavors through academic excellence, where all individuals who participate in University programs and activities can work and learn together in an atmosphere free of harassment, exploitation, or intimidation. Every member of the community should be aware that the University prohibits sexual violence and sexual harassment, retaliation, and other prohibited behavior (“Prohibited Conduct”) that violates law and/or University policy. The University will respond promptly and effectively to reports of Prohibited Conduct and will take appropriate action to prevent, to correct, and when necessary, to discipline behavior that violates this policy on Sexual Violence and Sexual Harassment (hereafter referred to as *Policy*).

This *Policy* addresses the University of California’s responsibilities and procedures related to Prohibited Conduct in order to ensure an equitable and inclusive education and employment environment free of sexual violence and sexual harassment. The *Policy* defines conduct prohibited by the University of California and explains the administrative procedures the University uses to resolve reports of Prohibited Conduct.”

Definitions

Complainant: Any person who files a report of sexual violence or sexual harassment or other prohibited behavior or retaliation or any person who has been the alleged subject of such Prohibited Conduct or retaliation.

Consent: is affirmative, conscious, voluntary, and revocable. Consent to sexual activity requires of both persons an affirmative, conscious, and voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity. It is the responsibility of each person to ensure they have the affirmative consent of the other to engage in the sexual activity. Lack of protest, lack of resistance, or silence, do not alone constitute consent. Affirmative consent must be ongoing and can be revoked at any time during sexual activity. The existence of a dating relationship or past sexual relations between the persons involved should never by itself be assumed to be an indicator of consent (nor will subsequent sexual relations or dating relationship alone suffice as evidence of consent to prior conduct). Consent cannot be given when a person is incapacitated. A person cannot consent when unconscious or experiencing intervals of consciousness. A person cannot consent under the threat of violence, bodily injury or other forms of coercion. A person cannot consent if his/her understanding of the act is affected by a physical or mental impairment.

Consensual Relationships: While romantic and sexual relationships between members of the University community may begin as consensual, instances of Prohibited Conduct may occur within such relationships. Accordingly, a report of Prohibited Conduct that occurs within the context of a consensual relationship will be treated as any other report.

Respondent: A person alleged to have engaged in Prohibited Conduct and about whom a report of sexual violence, sexual harassment, other prohibited behavior, or retaliation is made.

Responsible Employee: Any University employee, or any person affiliated with the University, who is not a Confidential Resource and who receives, in the course of employment, information that a student (undergraduate, graduate, or professional) has suffered sexual violence, sexual harassment or other prohibited behavior shall promptly notify the Title IX Officer or designee.

Responsible Employee: Any University employee who is not a Confidential Resource (UC campus CARE Advocates, licensed counselors, Ombuds, or any person with a professional license requiring confidentiality) and who receives, in the course of employment, information that a student (undergraduate, graduate, or professional) has been a target of Prohibited Conduct shall promptly notify the UCEAP Title IX Officer or designee.

Prohibited Conduct

The UCEAP Sexual Violence and Sexual Harassment Policy (SVSH Policy) prohibits, sexual violence, sexual harassment, retaliation, and other prohibited behavior as defined in this section.

Sexual Violence

Sexual violence is a term which, at the University of California, encompasses these four issues: sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking. Like discrimination and harassment, they are all prohibited under the law and under University policy.

Sexual Harassment is unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal, nonverbal, or physical conduct of a sexual nature, when 1) a person's submission to such conduct implicitly or explicitly made the basis for employment decisions, academic evaluation, grades or advancement, or other decisions affecting participation in a University program; or 2) such conduct is sufficiently severe or pervasive that it unreasonably denies, adversely limits, or interferes with a person's participation in or benefit from the education, employment, or other programs and services of the University, and creates an environment that a reasonable person would find to be intimidating or offensive.

Sexual harassment may include incidents between any members of the University of California community, including faculty and other academic appointees, staff, coaches, residents, interns, and non-student or non-employee participants in University programs, (e.g., local partners, vendors, contractors, visitors, and patients). Sexual harassment may occur in hierarchical relationships or between peers, or between individuals of any gender or gender identity.

Consideration is given to the totality of the circumstances in which the conduct occurred..

Consistent with the [University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students, Policy 100.00](#) on Student Conduct and Discipline, Section 102.09, harassment is defined as that is so severe and/or pervasive, and objectively offensive, and that so substantially impairs a person's access to University programs or activities that the person is effectively denied equal access to the University's resources and opportunities. Harassment includes, but is not limited to, conduct that is motivated on the basis of a person's race, color, national or ethnic origin, citizenship, sex, religion, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, pregnancy, marital status, ancestry, service in the uniformed services, physical or mental disability, medical condition, or perceived membership in any of these classifications.

A definition of sexual harassment abroad must take into account the norms of the given culture. Cultural norms abroad are often different from those in the U.S.; therefore, harassment issues may be particularly difficult to identify abroad. However, being culturally sensitive does not include relaxing personal boundaries. The individual should trust his/her judgment and intuition. If a situation makes him/her uncomfortable, it needs to be addressed. The individual should never ignore sexual harassment, as ignoring it may escalate the situation.

Domestic Violence is conduct by a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the Complainant; or a person with whom the Complainant shares a child in common, that intentionally, or recklessly, causes bodily injury to the Complainant or another, or places the Complainant or another in reasonable fear of serious bodily injury.

Dating Violence is conduct by a person who is or has been in a romantic or intimate relationship with the Complainant that intentionally, or recklessly, causes bodily injury to the Complainant or places the Complainant in reasonable fear of serious bodily injury.

Stalking is repeated conduct directed at a Complainant (e.g., following, monitoring, observing, surveilling, threatening, communicating or interfering with property), of a sexual or romantic nature or motivation, that would cause a reasonable person to fear for their safety, or the safety of others, or to suffer substantial emotional distress. Stalking of a non-sexual nature is addressed by other University policies including but not limited to the [Policy on Student Conduct and Discipline Section 102.10](#).

Retaliation includes threats, intimidation, reprisals, and/or adverse employment or educational actions against a person based on their report of Prohibited Conduct or participation in the investigation, report, remedial, or disciplinary processes provided for in this Policy.

Invasions of Sexual Privacy without a person's consent, watching or enabling others to watch that person's nudity or sexual act in a place where that person has a reasonable expectation of privacy. Without a person's consent, making

photographs (including videos) or audio recordings, or posting, transmitting or distributing such recorded material depicting that person's nudity or sexual acts in a place where the person has a reasonable expectation of privacy. Using depictions of nudity or sexual activity to extort something of value from a person is also an invasion of sexual privacy.

Sexual intercourse with a person under the age of 18.

Exposing one's genitals in a public place for the purpose of sexual gratification.

Failing to comply with the terms of a no-contact order, a suspension of any length, or any order of exclusion issued under this Policy.

Sexual Harassment Abroad

Sexual harassment is one of the most common forms of assault in the sexual assault continuum. Approximately 50-80% of women and 10-20% of men will experience sexual harassment in the U.S. at some point in their careers. Harassment issues may be particularly difficult to identify abroad, where cultural norms are often very different from those in the U.S. A fair rule of thumb is to assume that sexual harassment consists of any unwanted sexual advances and behavior of a verbal, visual, written, or physical nature in living arrangements or in educational or work environments.

Note that the U.S. description of sexual harassment may differ from the host country description. In such a case, you are encouraged to discuss these issues, if you feel comfortable, with the Study Center faculty or staff or Liaison Officer to determine an appropriate course of action.

Trust your judgment and intuition. If a situation makes you uncomfortable, it needs to be addressed. Never ignore sexual harassment. Ignoring it will not make it go away; most likely it will just make it worse. Both males and females can be sexually harassed, and the perpetrator can be male or female and of the same or opposite gender. Seek help from UCEAP Systemwide and on-site personnel, who can provide counseling and advice.

Street Harassment

Never endure behaviors that feel unsafe or uncomfortable to you. If it feels inappropriate or makes you uneasy, get yourself out of the situation. Never sacrifice yourself or your sense of safety for the sake of cultural sensitivity.

Street harassment happens everywhere in the world, including the U.S. Certain countries like Morocco, India and much of Latin America are known for more solicitous attitudes towards women walking alone. Many times the best strategy for minimizing harassment is to simply ignore it. If someone wants your attention, for your phone number or for anything else, end it with a simple no and walk away if they will not take no for an answer. Do not continue a conversation with anyone who makes you uncomfortable. It's not rude—it is perfectly appropriate. If you ever feel unsafe, remove yourself from the situation immediately. Title IX

Title IX protects UC students from sexual harassment in UC programs, including programs that occur abroad in classroom settings or internships. In addition to the investigation, UC Title IX Officers are also responsible for eliminating the harassment, prevent its recurrence and addressing the effects of the sexual harassment whether or not the perpetrator is known or affiliated with UC. Title IX obligates the University to try to prevent recurrence by following up with outside parties to the extent possible to mitigate the likelihood of recurrence of any future sexual harassment, and address the effects of the offense.

If You Have Been Sexually Harassed

- Trust what you are feeling. Many people feel ashamed or humiliated because of the harassment. It is not your fault and you do not have to endure it.
- Take one step at a time—it is easy to feel overwhelmed. If possible, talk to the harasser.

- Clearly and firmly tell the harasser that you want the behavior to stop. If you can, tell the harasser how the behavior makes you feel.
- Let the harasser know that you will take further action if the harassment does not stop.
- Keep records. It is very important to write down dates, times, places, and witnesses to what happened.
- If you receive any notes, emails, or written letters from the harasser, keep them. You can use documented information to support a complaint.
- Report the incident to the local UCEAP Study Center staff or Liaison Officer immediately. They can provide guidance and referrals. If you need further assistance, or if you do not feel comfortable with the Study Center or Liaison Office, contact the UCEAP Regional Director for your program. If You Are a Respondent to a Claim of Sexual Violence or Harassment

The University has a duty under Title IX to resolve complaints promptly and equitably and to provide a safe and nondiscriminatory environment for all students, free from sexual harassment and sexual violence. If you are told that your behavior is inappropriate and/or offensive, you must immediately stop the behavior. People perceive certain behaviors, jokes, and gestures, etc., differently. What may be acceptable to you may be extremely offensive to someone else. Sometimes due to the difference in culture you may not think your comment(s) or behavior is offensive. You should try to understand the other person's feelings and concerns and respect his or her request to stop the sexual harassment

UCEAP will ensure that appropriate actions are taken to aid the Complainant, i.e. academic assistance, counseling referrals, housing assistance, permanent no contact restrictions for the Respondent, and protection from retaliation.

For students who have been charged with violating the Code of Student Conduct and face suspension or dismissal, student affairs case managers with the Division of Student Affairs, Respondent Services, will provide resources, information, and referrals such as counseling and academic support.

After a Sexual Assault

Rape and sexual assault can happen to women and men anywhere in the world. Sexual assault is very traumatic whenever or wherever it happens but the trauma can be more difficult to manage when it happens abroad. Every survivor deals with an assault experience differently. Don't blame yourself. It is difficult to know how to feel, what to do, and what options there are.

- Go to a safe place and get help. Call a friend, or someone else you trust who can give you support. Trust your feelings.
- Consider talking to local UCEAP staff/partners immediately or the UCEAP Systemwide Office.
- Contact a local or UC campus crisis hotline for survivors of sexual assault.
- Contact your UC campus confidential CARE advocate. The campus advocate is trained to address sexual violence, sexual assault, stalking, and dating and domestic violence. Refer to the [University of California resources](#) listed in this document.
- Consider getting medical attention to treat any possible injuries and to check for injuries you may not see. It is covered by the UCEAP travel insurance. Taking care of your body is a first step in regaining control of your life.
- The UCEAP travel insurance policy provides emergency reunion benefit to a family member to travel to your side. However, benefits will not be paid unless the insurance company authorizes all expenses in advance.
- Consider getting local counseling. It is covered by the UCEAP travel insurance.
- Reporting the incident to local law enforcement or UCEAP officials is completely up to you. Understanding that reporting is an intensely personal process, and is considered empowering and therapeutic for some yet emotionally draining and unsatisfactory for others, the University respects your right to decide whether or not to report.

Reporting Sexual Violence to UCEAP

While most UCEAP students abroad do not experience sexual assault, UCEAP officials are becoming more aware of students being sexually assaulted while abroad because students are choosing to report.

Certain UCEAP employees, such as the Title IX Liaison, Regional Directors, supervisors, Study Center Directors, Resident Directors, host university staff and others acting on behalf of UCEAP abroad have the responsibility to respond quickly and report allegations of policy violations, even if the individual making the report requests that no action be taken.

Cultural and social attitudes toward rape and sexual assault survivors may vary greatly in different countries. The support you receive from law enforcement officials and others, in addition to the resources available to you, will vary from country to country. In some countries, if you tell a medical professional that you have been raped, he or she is legally required to report your name and situation to the police. In the U.S. you have the legal right to refuse speaking with the police. Laws in other countries may provide you with more or less decision making power. If in doubt and you must seek care, do not disclose that you were raped. Consult with UCEAP staff/faculty abroad.

UCEAP has identified two individuals (The Director of International Health, Safety and Emergency Response for students, and the Human Resource Director for staff/faculty) with whom members of the UCEAP community can consult for advice and information regarding making a report of sexual violence. These individuals have the responsibility to report allegations of policy violations to the campus Title IX Officer.

Reporting to Local Police

If you were sexually assaulted, you do not have to report what happened to the police but, if you decide to do so, the local UCEAP representative can help you deal with the police and other authorities. You may not feel that you can cope with the police and legal procedures or the added complexity because the assault took place abroad. This includes possible language difficulties, a different legal system, expense and other practicalities. If you do wish to report to the police, try to do it as soon as possible to preserve any forensic evidence.

If you choose to report the rape to the police, it is important that you do not:

- have a shower or a bath
- brush your teeth
- go to the restroom until after you have seen a doctor
- As hard as it may be not to clean up you may destroy important evidence if you do
- If you want to report the rape, it is best to contact the police as soon as possible.

If you are unsure whether a local doctor is required to report to the police when you go for care, and you do not want to report the assault, you may choose to obtain medical care without providing information about the assault.

Privacy

UCEAP will protect the privacy of individuals involved in a report of sexual harassment or sexual violence to the extent required by law and University of California policy. A report of sexual harassment or sexual violence may result in the gathering of extremely sensitive information about individuals in the University community. While such information is considered confidential, University policy regarding access to public records and disclosure of personal information may require disclosure of certain information concerning a report of sexual harassment or sexual violence. In such cases, every effort shall be made to redact the records to protect the privacy of individuals.

An individual who has made a report of sexual harassment or sexual violence may be advised of sanctions imposed against the Respondent when the individual needs to be aware of the sanction for it to be fully effective (such as restrictions on communication or contact with the Complainant who made the report). In addition, when the offense involves a crime of violence or a non-forcible sex offense, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act permits disclosure to the complainant the final results of a disciplinary proceeding against the alleged accused, regardless of whether the University concluded that a violation was committed. Information regarding disciplinary action taken against the accused shall not be disclosed without the accused's consent, or unless it is necessary to ensure compliance with the action or the safety of individuals.

Confidentiality of Reports of Sexual Harassment and Sexual Violence

UCEAP has identified two individuals (UCEAP Systemwide Human Resource Director for staff/faculty, and UCEAP Systemwide Director of International Health, Safety and Emergency Response for students) with whom members of the UCEAP community can consult for advice and information regarding making a report of sexual harassment or sexual violence. These resources provide individuals who may be interested in bringing a report of sexual harassment or sexual violence with a safe venue to discuss their concerns and learn about the procedures and potential outcomes involved.

As an office of record, they have the responsibility to report allegations of policy violations. While some level of disclosure may be necessary to ensure a complete and fair investigation, the University will comply with requests for confidentiality to the extent possible.

Certain University employees, such as the Title IX Officer, Regional Directors, supervisors, Study Center Directors, Resident Directors, host university staff and other UCEAP representatives (administrative managers, program officers, etc.), are obligated to respond to reports of sexual harassment or sexual violence, even if the individual making the report requests that no action be taken.

An individual's requests regarding the confidentiality of reports of sexual harassment or sexual violence will be considered in determining an appropriate response; however, such requests will be assessed in the dual contexts of UCEAP's legal obligation to ensure a working and learning environment free from sexual harassment and sexual violence and the due process rights of the Respondent to be informed of the allegations and their source.

Reporting vs. Not Reporting

The decision to file a formal report or complaint about sexual violence and sexual assault is a personal choice. It is your right to choose whether to report. There are several confidential resources at your UC campus who can help you make an informed decision regarding reporting. You may choose to report the assault right away, after taking some time to get support and take care of yourself, or you may choose to never report the assault. It is entirely up to you.

[Confidential campus CARE advocates](#) can explain your options in detail and answer questions, so you can make the decision that's right for you. Talking to the advocate doesn't constitute filing an official report about sexual violence. The details of your experience will not be shared with anyone without your permission.

If You Choose To Report

Feel free to talk to a trusted friend or colleague. Keep in mind that managers, supervisors and certain employees such as athletic coaches, faculty advisors, teaching assistants and resident advisors are required to report to the Title IX Officer. You may also choose to report directly to your Title IX Officer on your UC campus.

If You Choose Not To Report

If you decide not to file a formal report, all campus resources remain available to support you. The confidential CARE Advocate can provide immediate confidential support and explain UC campus resources.

UCEAP Resources

Any member of the UCEAP community may report conduct that may constitute sexual harassment. In addition, supervisors, managers, and other designated employees are responsible for taking whatever action is necessary to prevent sexual harassment, to correct it when it occurs, and to report it promptly to the Title IX Officer.

Federal Laws

UC complies with state and federal laws related to sexual violence. These include, but are not limited to, the following laws:

Title IX prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex under any federally funded education program (P.L. 92-318 [PDF](#)). Under Title IX, sexual harassment, which includes sexual violence, is a form of unlawful sex discrimination. Schools that receive federal financial assistance must take steps to prevent sexual violence and sexual harassment, and promptly and effectively respond to reports of sexual violence and sexual harassment.

The Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) is a Federal law that was enacted in 1994 to change attitudes toward domestic violence, foster awareness of domestic violence, improve services and provisions for survivors, and revise the manner in which the criminal justice system responds to domestic violence and sex crimes. Since 1994, VAWA has been modified and reauthorized several times.

The Clery Act requires colleges and universities that participate in federal financial aid programs to report annual crime statistics on or near their campuses and to provide other safety and crime information to the campus community (P.L. 101-542 [PDF](#)). The Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) amendments to the Clery Act expand the rights afforded to campus survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.
